Hope to see you on the docks soon!





OVERLAND TRANSFER


On May 15th, four intrepid volunteers made the trek to New London, NH, to transport *Ganges II* from its repose in a New London barn to its new place of glory in the Museum's exhibit hall. Two weeks previous the same crew had visited *Ganges II* and the rest of its cohort of boats donated from the Stowell collection to assess roadworthiness of the trailers involved. We checked bearings, lights and tires and topped up inflations to assure an uneventful ride to Wolfeboro

Ganges II was ready to go, well, almost - no lights on the trailer. We can fix that. Rob Lawrence, NHBM volunteer, produced a 21st century set of wireless lights that clamp magnetically to the trailer. Now Ganges II was ready to roll. Meanwhile, we extracted two other smaller boats from their storage spaces for the trip to Wolfeboro. Three tow vehicles, three boats on trailers, one chase vehicle. The convoy is about to depart. Wait! Rob's truck's electrical system isn't charging! He is running on battery power. How long will that last? There is one way to find out. A spare boat battery is found. Bring that along just in case. What could possibly go wrong?

Lunch time passed a while ago, but no restaurant parking lot can accommodate this parade. There will be time for lunch another day. We are off.

About halfway between Potter Place and Danbury we learned the limit of Rob's battery capacity. We also learned that the spare battery didn't fit and couldn't be used. Rob and John Van in

the chase vehicle drove all the way to Bristol to find another battery to buy in order to continue the trip. The new battery installed, the trip was completed without further adventure. *Ganges II* was in Wolfeboro.



Ganges II was in Wolfeboro but not yet in the Museum. Ganges

II is long and tall. Its trailer is very wide. The Museum door is not very tall or very wide. Measurements taken months before indicated that it would fit with 2 or 3 inches to spare all around. How good were those measurements?

The Restoration Shop crew assembled as usual on Monday morning and was promptly assigned to boat-moving duty. We all held our breath while Rob skillfully backed the trailer right through the door into the Museum. There were inches (just a few) to spare! Now the fun begins.

Using just about every gantry, hoist, jack, spreader and strap we could find or borrow, we were able to safely lift *Ganges II* off her trailer just enough to slide the trailer out from under. This time the clearance was 0 inches. At last, five hours later, we could exhale, lower *Ganges II* onto museum floor dollies and roll her into her display space. Was it worth all that? You be the judge. Come see.

Cast Credits

The efforts of many volunteers made *Ganges'* terrific travel adventure possible. They must be recognized: Rob Lawrence of Lakes Region Wooden Boats had the leading role. Supporting actors were John Van, Doug Smith and Bob Sterndale. Restoration Shop crewmembers made the transfer into the Museum scene possible: Zeke Bly, Frank DeMore Struan Robinson and Charlie Silfvenius.





BEHIND THE SCENES

While a great deal of thought and effort goes into the exhibits and programs you see, a good deal of the Museum's work may not be so obvious. Our collection, facilities and equipment require a lot of attention in order to bring these exhibits and programs to you.

The big news in the facilities department is the quest for a new Museum on Bay St. While the Capital Campaign races to the financial finish line, the Site Committee races to be ready for ground breaking as soon as the funding is available. Toward that end, we now have both an architect and construction manager actively working on the preconstruction phase of the project. Developing design details and final costing and obtaining all permits are our goals for 2021. We want to be at the starting line with our engine racing when the funding light goes green!

At the same time, we need a place to keep our boat collection including several spectacular boats recently acquired. The Site Committee has been working with the Exhibits and Collections Committees on a large scale "collections care" project that will include the construction of a storage facility for the Museum's growing boat collection. The design plans and a builder are lined up. The Site Committee is now taking the appropriate permitting steps with the town. We want the building ready to receive boats by early next summer. This "collections care" project is a tremendous step forward for NHBM in the preservation and care of its collection. We're charged with preserving it in perpetuity for the public. We welcome donations towards "collections care" as we move forward.

Meanwhile back at the Museum, we continue to work to improve the appearance and functionality of the existing building. After major improvements in 2019, we have made further enhancements to lighting, temperature and humidity regulation (we now monitor and record both temperature and humidity), building air leakage, safety and security. A new VOIP phone service goes in shortly. Routine chores such as cleaning, painting, mowing and shoveling (yes!) require constant attention too.

Back here behind the scenes, many facilities volunteer hours are devoted to maintaining and improving the Museum to make your visit enjoyable. Much of this work would be noticed only in its absence. We strive to be unnoticed!

Spring is flying by; the town is busier with each new weekend, and the Wolfeboro Vintage Race Boat Regatta is just around the corner. As most of you know, the regatta packs a big vintage race boat show into two days on the water preceded by a couple of days getting all the boats registered and inspected along with evening activities for everyone Thursday, Friday, and Saturday.

We enjoy having one of the best vintage race boat events in the country right here in Wolfeboro. We have a great location, a good relationship with the town, and a list of dedicated talented volunteers as long as your arm. It's the volunteers that painstakingly produce a show which provides the best experience possible for spectators and also for the boat owners, drivers, and crew members.

The regatta committee started regular planning meetings for this year's

regatta in January with monthly meetings since then to ensure even the smallest of details would not be overlooked. There are a lot of things to take care of: permits, sanctions, insurance, invitations to boat owners, registrations, a crane to launch the hydroplanes, venues for the evening activities, sponsors, logistics for actually orchestrating the two days of running race boats on the bay, and the list goes on and on.

Many thanks to the committee members for the many months of work to bring a show like this together, and to the many volunteers that will be on hand to manage it all. It couldn't be done without them. You might like to know how many volunteers it takes to run the Wolfeboro regatta...Well, we always refer to a hundred volunteers, but the list is really around one hundred and twenty five.

Participants! There would be no reason for all that hard work and support if we



THE OTHER BOAT YARD

Ask most long-time residents of the Lakes Region to name where in Wolfeboro boats were commercially produced, and they will tell you the Goodhue & Hawkins Navy Yard. Ask them to name another yard in Wolfeboro, and you will most likely get a blank look.

However, there was another boat yard commercially producing boats in Wolfeboro. It was well-known and highly respected in its day and unfortunately has become lost in the mists of history.

The Museum's Exhibits team stumbled upon its existence almost by accident while researching the *Regina*. The corporate history of Goodhue &

Hawkins, generally received the credit for building the *Regina*. The hulls of the long-decked lakers were framed and planked at a boat yard on Clark Point in the early 1900s. Then they floated over to Sewall Road where the engines were installed and the fitting-out was done.

What boat yard? There is no mention of a boat yard in Parker's History of Wolfeboro of which we are aware. Nor have we seen any pictures from the Historical Society or in the various photo histories of a boat yard other than Goodhue & Hawkins some of which go back to its founding.

However, there is a very brief mention in volume three of *The History of*

Wolfeboro, NH 1770-1994 by Q. David Bowers. The boat building operation on Clark Point was that of the C. H. Ray Company. And here is where it gets even more interesting: the "C.H." was Catherine Hudson Ray.

Through genealogical research, Nancy Mershon Black was able to establish that Catherine Hudson was born in 1875. She marries Edward Chester Ray in Rhode Island at the age of 21. By 1903 they have moved to Wolfeboro and own a home on Clark Point. EC Ray, among other things, paints signs and carriages. He is apparently also building boats. Why E.C. Ray chose to put his company in his wife's name is not known. Possibly to separate it from his other business interests.

In 1910 E.C. Ray lists his occupation in the census records as a boat builder and is working with his brother in law, Henry F. Hudson.

.

Roger Read, a long-time summer resident of Melvin Village and owner of one of two C.H. Ray boats (other than those built for Goodhue) known to still exist on the lake, has traced a connection between the C. H. Ray Company and naval architect Charles D. Mower.

In the July 1915 *Rudder* magazine a brief article includes a set of drawings by Mower of a speed runabout that is to be built by the C.H. Ray Company for Dr. A. H. Wood of Boston who will use her on Lake Winnipiseogee, NH. The boat is 35', has a 5' 6" beam and is to be equipped with a Van Blerck motor.

Charles D. Mower was one of the leading naval architects of the time. One of his designs was selected among a number of entries by the Thousand Island Yacht Club for a one-design fleet to promote interest in motor boat racing on the St. Lawrence River during the 1910 season. An article in *MotorBoat* magazine from that year describes the boat as, "28 feet over all,

with 5 feet beam, straight stem with quite high freeboard forward and a straight sheer carried to the V transom stern." These boats are what we would call classic lakers today. Twenty of them were to be built.

Most of Mower's surviving designs are housed at the Mystic Seaport Library, Mystic, CT, where a total of 433 sheets represent 107 designs.

In 1916, the C.H. Ray Company has become a successful enough boatworks that they take out a halfpage advertisement in the February edition of *Power Boating* magazine for the New York boat show that year. Their ad states that they are represented at the Lowe-Victor Motors booth at the show.

Perhaps like Icarus, the Rays flew too close to the sun. In 1917 Catherine dies of ovarian and colon cancer at age 42. On Monday morning January 7, 1918, at about 3:00 am the C.H. Ray Company boat yard was destroyed by fire. According to an article in the *Granite State News* found by Nancy Mershon Black, there were three boats in various states of construction that


were destroyed and four in storage destroyed as well.

The article ends by saying, "Mr. Ray has won a fine reputation as a boat-builder, constructing some of the finest plying out on our lake, and had contracts to keep him busy this winter. His plant was quite extensive and equipped with modern machinery."

E.C. Ray didn't use serial numbers and never produced a catalogue. It is believed that only three C.H. Ray are known to still exist. The long boat, *Circus Wings*, owned by Roger Read, is currently undergoing restoration on Leets Island, CT. The Ray name was found inscribed on the interior of the boat. It is owned by the Windsor family and has been berthed for many years in Roberts Cove. It was featured in an article in *Classic Boating* magazine in May/June 1999. A third possible 1910 Ray was sold by Delta Marine Sales recently out of Stockton, California.

The C. H. Ray boatyard existed on land that is now owned by Barbara Zulauf Sharp. A few years ago the family had the rails from the boat launch removed. They were the last vestiges of this once prominent boat yard.

We've added a few extra touches to our continuing exhibition of "LOCALLY PRODUCED" with amazing boats and water skis made right here in NH.

Over the winter we've been busy researching, interviewing and filming relatives of early Wolfeboro boat builders Otto Pecunies and Nat Goodhue, and Ossipee's Nelson Nickerson. You will also see a new section on the old Lakeport, New Hampshire boat building company F. W. Johnson and some of our Lakeport -made McDuff engines in the display.

On stage, this year, you will see our brand new rowing exhibit, we call "Who's In The Boat?" Come visit and learn about the relationship the state of New Hampshire has with competitive and recreational rowing dating back to 1852 in Center Harbor where competitive collegiate rowing and the first intercollegiate competition of any kind began with the Harvard - Yale crew regatta, and the stories behind it.

In the rowing exhibit we also look at the role Granite State women have played in crew; from Stratham New Hampshire's Ernestine Beyer - known as the "mother of rowing" to Wolfeboro's Hilary Gehman who is currently training and coaching women athletes for the 2021 Tokyo Summer Olympics. FREE VESSEL SAFETY CHECKS By The Lakes Region Sail and Power Squadron

What is a Vessel Safety Check? It is the checking of the required safety equipment on your boat, including lights and other electric equipment. It also includes examining the engine compartment for cleanliness.

Why have a Vessel Safety Check? Upon completion of the VSC by a qualified member of the Lakes Region Sail & Power Squadron (and carrying out necessary requirements), a sticker is presented which can be attached to your boat. This indicates to others that you've had a Safety Check, and everything worked.

What happens if I don't pass? You get the opportunity to fix what didn't work with no penalty and then you would probably receive that sticker. The Vessel Safety Check is **FREE** and **CONFIDENTIAL.**

The vessel examiner is a member of the United States Power Squadron, and in this area, a member of the Lakes Region Sail & Power Squadron. He is a certified volunteer who has been trained to perform these checks. A VSC takes between 15 and 20 minutes to complete.
