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


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### **DIRECTOR'S NOTES**

New this season: We have gone to an On-Line Reservation system through PeekPro. For reservations, go to the New






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While the water was hard, the New Hampshire Boat Museum Back Bay Skippers continued to work on sailing skills and do some badly-needed maintenance on their boats. Two of our skippers, Anthony Quinn and Rick Laird, are building new US12s. No one produces the US12 in the U.S. so they had to be imported from Canada.

Tim Wright has been holding monthly sailing instructions on Zoom, assisted

by Steve Leker and B. B. Wright. Half our skippers have been attending these training sessions that concentrate on rules, tactics, and tuning. The classes are being taped so those unable to attend can watch the presentations at their leisure.

It looks like we will again have a full model yacht building class this year, and rigging parts are being readied for the 2022 workshop. In past years, the kits arrived complete, but now the kits include parts only from the deck down, requiring instructors to manufacture the rig and sails.

The season is almost upon us, and it won't be long before you see our fleets on the waters of Back Bay. Stop by from 1 PM to 3 PM to watch Solings on Tuesday and US12s on Thursday all season long, weather permitting. Our rain day is Wednesday for both fleets.




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
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### A Hank Why Remembrance

### 2022 Programs & Events Highlights

With the snow melted and the ice receding, the 2022 season is upon us and is shaping up to be a busy one at the Museum. This year, we will see the return of favorite classes along with several new offerings. Some of these classes focus on increasing boater education while others let us explore our creative sides.

#### **OLD FAVORITES**

Back again this year are our popular Youth Boat Building class and Community Sailing program. These programs have been staples for many years and provide knowledge and skills that are life long. Adult & Family Boat Building and Model Yacht Building are both returning this summer. Registration is open and classes are filling up fast. Mark your calendars for the Sasquatch Regatta on June 18th with the Back Bay Skippers.

### YOUNG SKIPPERS

For the younger skippers, our Lake Discovery Family Days and Story Time with the Wolfeboro Public Library are sure to be fun and will take place once a month in June, July and August.

### **BOATING SAFETY**

New this year are programs focused on boating safety. On June 18th, the Museum in partnership with US Power Squadron will be presenting the America's Boating Course at the Wolfeboro Public Library. The America's Boating Course teaches basic boating knowledge including how to recognize and handle hazards. This course satisfies the State of New Hampshire's required boater education course for boaters operating a vessel powered by a motor of 25 horsepower or more. Participants who pass the test



at the end of the course will receive laminated certificates.

### WOMEN SKIPPERS

Also on June 18th, is our new women's program, *Ready to Launch*, which will take place at the Back Bay Town Docks in Wolfeboro. *Ready to Launch* is geared toward women boaters to give them a friendly and safe environment to learn boating basics. This course will give novices a solid foundation on understanding the basic structure of a boat, simple repairs and safety checks before heading out on the water. The class will be taught by Jacob Marsh, an associate professor of Marine Technology, at Lakes Region Community College.

#### ART CLASSES


Exploring our creative side, the Museum will be bringing you two

art class sessions this summer. They will take place in Wolfeboro both Meredith. and The Wolfeboro course. En Plein Air with Lauren Hammond, will have two classes at Albee Beach on Lake Wentworth.

In these classes participants will work in their preferred medium while focusing on landscapes. Lauren Hammond is a Wolfeboro artist who is currently teaching art at Brewster Academy. Hammond finds her inspiration in nature, especially the lakes and mountains of New Hampshire. The two classes are single day programs and will be on August 10th and August 16th.

In Meredith, the art sessions will include four classes. The classes entitled, Travel Sketch Books: Along Shores of Winnipesaukee, are designed for the artist that loves to keep a sketchbook close at hand while traveling. All the classes will be taught by Stephen Hoedecker, a Meredith based artist. Hoedecker has over thirty years of experience and his work includes beautiful landscapes of rural New Hampshire and coastal Maine. The classes, Travel Sketch Books: Along Shores of Winnipesaukee, will take place on June 26th, July 14th, August 28th and September 11th. All classes will given at Church Landing.

### THE FITZHENRY RETURNS TO WOLFEBORO

Oscar York (1884–1960) was one of Wolfeboro's more colorful characters. Known as "OD", he was a box maker, sawmill worker and steamboat operator. Living on Sewall Road, his property was such a junkyard that 14 of his neighbors sued him, requiring that a clean up take place. The hearing was held in a

packed Brewster Auditorium and took two days. One of the items in that yard was an old steamboat engine that had been pulled from Lake Winnipesaukee.

According to its identification plate, the engine, a compound two-cylinder steam engine, was built by the E. I. Fitzhenry Company in Boston in 1900. It had been made for, and installed in, the yacht Iona II by Dr. Henry D. Bradford. Bradford and his partners ran a passenger and mail delivery from Wolfeboro to the islands and Alton. At some point the Iona II was acquired by OD York. Unfortunately, it sank in shallow water just off his dock in 1933. OD and a young summer camper named Charles Atwood, whom he had befriended, eventually salvaged the engine to York's yard. It remained there until York passed away in 1960. Acquired from York's estate by Atwood, it was taken to his home in Massachusetts. After Atwood died in the late 1970s, his widow offered the engine to the Charles River Museum of Industry and Innovation in Waltham, MA. Their museum volunteers, Bud Hansen and Walter Bush, worked for six months to fully restore the engine.

Our Museum's 2022 exhibit will focus on the golden age of New Hampshire

lakes' steamboats. Therefore, it seemed appropriate to bring the *Fitzhenry* engine back to Wolfeboro. The Charles River Museum of Industry and Innovation was pleased to loan it to us provided we transported and removed it in March. After being closed for two years because of COVID, they planned an opening in


April and needed time to reposition their collection.

So, St. Patrick's Day a group of NHBM volunteers consisting of Bob Sterndale, Lawton Read, Charlie Silfvenius, Frank DeMore, John van Lonkhuyzen, Rob Lawrence of Lakes Region Wooden Boat, and a rented U-Haul from Andrew Swenson's Executive Carwash & Detail, set out for Waltham, MA.

The Fitzhenry was lifted with two floor jacks, put on a doctored dolly and shoved and pulled up a two-story ramp to the rear entrance of the old mill building that the Charles River Museum occupies. It was then winched up the truck's ramp and strapped in to the box so it was immobile. After our arrival at NHBM it turned out that it had been easier to get it on the truck than it was getting it off. However, with some effort, it is safely ensconced in the Museum

awaiting summer visitors.

Unfortunately, the whole process took longer than expected, and the crew missed out on a Saint Paddy's Guinness and corned beef lunch - maybe when the engine returns to the Charles River Museum of Industry and Innovation in the fall.

### **New Horizons for the New Hampshire Boat Museum**

We are excited to announce our expansion to a new location in Moultonborough, New Hampshire!

The NH Boat Museum Board of Trustees has been engaged for several years in a Capital Campaign to design and construct a new facility at its property on Bay Street in Wolfeboro. Recently we have experienced significant challenges, including rising

costs, supply issues, increasing labor costs, and an urgent need for a larger storage space for our permanent collection--which includes a fleet of historic wooden boats. The Board of Trustees decided to overcome these hurdles by taking a fresh look at ways to meet the Museum's mission without straining its financial stability.



The Board concluded that *purchasing* and relocating to an existing facility offered immediate solutions and new opportunities. We found an ideal site in Moultonborough with a building that could accommodate our urgent collection needs, while providing ample square footage for exhibition, educational, and program activities.

The Board has made an *offer to purchase* this facility.

### It offers significant benefits:

- It has nearly three times the capacity of the facility planned for Bay Street.
- The relocation and renovation can be accomplished with existing capital campaign funds and the sale of the Bay Street property.
- It will enable us to add funds to NHBM's endowment.
- It will meet our desire to have ample space for community programs.
- It will allow us to have the whole collection onsite.
- It expands the Museum's reach to the broader Lakes Region audience and grow our membership and donor base.
- With the greater volume of driveby traffic on Whittier Highway, we can expect a significant growth in visitors.
- Most importantly, we can renovate and open at the new location *years* ahead of the plan to construct at Bay Street.

Along with this chance to expand our horizons, NHBM will continue to offer its many Wolfeboro based activities and programs from Center Street including Youth and Family Boatbuilding, Community Sailing, Back Bay Skippers model yachting, *Millie B* rides on the lake, the annual New England Vintage Boat &

Car Auction, and the biennial Vintage Race Boat Regatta.

We are enthusiastic about this new direction and are grateful to you, our many donors, members, and visitors who support the Museum and are making this new opportunity possible. Thank you!

We look forward to **creating** an inspiring experience at our expanded location and will keep you posted on our progress.

### Midnight Miss Celebrates 50 Years

Look no further than Lake Winnipesaukee to bear witness to one of the finest classic vintage hydroplanes, in all the World. *Midnight Miss*, a 1972 blown 478ci Lauterbach Hydroplane is Internationally renown. She holds many National and International Championship records, including the 1990 Women's Water Speed record. The humble and talented owner of this sleek watercraft is Patrick Obed of Alton, New Hampshire.

Perhaps the stirring for his passion began with his 1<sup>st</sup> vintage race boat that he spied and purchased along the road in 2013 named *Rapid Fire*, a 1964 Barron Flat Bottom. Patrick completely restored and rebuilt *Rapid Fire* (a complete history of her restoration can be found at nhbm.org/race-boats/rapid-fire-sk-64). She made her debut at the annual Vintage Race Boat Regatta, a partnership between American Power Boat Association, Vintage and Historic Division, and the New Hampshire Boat Museum in 2015.

Patrick's confidence on the water began at an early age on Lake Manning in Gilmanton, NH. His parents would lull him to sleep as an infant on regular evening boat rides. By the age of 8 years, he was adventuring from dawn to dusk on the lake in a rowboat equipped with a 1.2 hp outboard engine. Patrick acknowledges that his comfort, self-assurance, and problem-solving skills became second nature from his lake life experiences. Waterskiing behind his parent's boats was a natural evolution for this competent teen.

Patrick's encouragement and inspiration into the Vintage Hydroplane racing circuit was through his friend, and "Can Do" mentor, Donnie Mclean. When Patrick discovered that *Midnight Miss* was available for sale, he emailed Donnie, "My Next Boat Ha! Ha! LOL". Aware of her remarkable history, that **Someday became Now**,



and Patrick purchased this fine boat with a stellar record in 2019. One of Patrick's fondest memories was taking the wheel in Canada, as Graham Coddington, the previous owner looked on, as he ran Saturday's heat at the Régates de Valleyfield in Quebec.


Patrick now participates in 4-5 vintage regatta events each year. He and *Midnight Miss* often travel to Wheeling WV., Tavares, Fla., New Martinsville, WV., Wolfeboro NH, and of course, largest vintage inboard hydroplane race on the continent, The Régates de Valleyfield.

This sleek black Hydro cannot be overlooked as *Midnight Miss* retains her Australian flag from her earlier racing days at Bundy Thunder in Queensland where she dominated the course and earned 4 Vintage championships. Patrick remains vigilant with his attention to every inch of his boat prior to each race. Safety is paramount. Checking for fuel leaks, rudder response and a sturdy skid fin are key. This hydroplane runs on methanol, pure alcohol, so much care must be taken in the re-fueling process.

Most of all, Patrick appreciates the unity of the vintage racing family. His passion is about the sharing and celebrations enjoyed by those that participate in putting on safe and trouble-free events for all the fans. He

is impassioned to share his experience, his insights, and skills to all that desire to keep the history of these vintage boats alive. There are many ways that NHBM members can be involved – from scorers, spotters, dock tenders, to inspectors that allow officials to focus on their roles. Patrick welcomes your questions and hopes you all continue to enjoy the beautifully restored race boats that once ruled the waters

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### **Community Sailing Program**

When people think about the NH Boat Museum, most think about the beautiful antique motorboats on display or our fun events or maybe our boat building program. Our Community Sailing programs may be the last thing they think of. These programs include "Learn to Sail" small boat courses for youth and adults, and more advanced classes using a variety of sailboat types/sizes, including adult keelboat instruction. Believe it or not, 140+ students take advantage of the sailing programs every season – except last year when we limited capacity due to COVID. Since the inception of the programs in 2003, over 2,500 youth and adults have learned to sail!!

To make these programs successful every year, the Museum has a dedicated cadre of volunteers who do their best to keep the aging fleet of boats in good shape. But indeed the fleet is aging we are still using several Sunfish that date back to the early 1970's. These boats receive a lot of wear and tear every year! So we desperately need newer Sunfish donations to enable us to swap out boats that are a bit long in the tooth, as the saying goes.

Addition of a more challenging type of sailboat to our Learn to Sail program for youth and adult students who are ready to advance from Sunfish. The new boats are 15' Vanguard Class sloops which require 2 crew. Having a larger sail area (foresail and mainsail) coupled with a more advanced hull design will enable advanced students to learn new skills, enjoy a faster boat, and learn about how to race in this competitive class of sailboat.



Martha Cummings, NHBM Executive Director, credited Smith with helping care for the Museum's existing facility over the course of the past 2 and a half years, while also advancing their Capital Campaign.

"Doug also helped transport the boats given to the Museum's collection from Dr. Stowell. This entailed several trips, from Lake Sunapee to Meredith then onto Wolfeboro" she said.

Geljookian said his award selection is the result of a team effort.

"I'm grateful for all of the volunteers that took time away from their families and businesses to keep an historically important part of the Boat Museum's DNA going," he said.

According to Cummings, Geljookian has been instrumental in the past three biennial Wolfeboro Vintage Race Boat Regattas. He learned the ropes, so to speak, from Rick Kourian, as his right hand man.

"Mike spent many hours putting together all the logistics and volunteers necessary for the racecourse, which required a very early moming start," she said. "He and his crew also oversaw the safe maneuvering of the hydroplanes with the crane. With Mikein charge of the 'hot pits,' we knew safety was a top priority and that he had it under control."

Serving as Launch Director for the Regatta for the first time in 2021, Geljookian assembled a wide range of local marine business owners. employees and close friends who all share the same passion for boating.

"In the end, they all not only wanted to personally let me know that they were in for the 2023 event, but some of them were even motivated to purchase their own piece of Regatta history-specifically, a Jersey Skiff," he said. "It was great to see the group's reinforced commitment to future events and equally important to see the interest in keeping the boats alive that make the Regatta possible."



### FREE VESSEL SAFETY CHECKS By The Lakes Region Sail and Power Squadron

What is a Vessel Safety Check? It is the checking of the required safety equipment on your boat, including lights and other electric equipment. It also includes examining the engine compartment for cleanliness.

Why have a Vessel Safety Check? You have your car inspected annually, so why not have your boat inspected for safety? Upon completion of the VSC by a qualified member of the Lakes Region Sail & Power Squadron (and carrying out necessary requirements), a sticker is presented which can be attached to your boat. This indicates to others that you've had a Safety Check, and everything worked.

What happens if I don't pass? You get the opportunity to fix what didn't work with no penalty and then you would probably receive that sticker. The Vessel Safety Check is FREE and CONFIDENTIAL.

The vessel examiner is a member of the United States Power Squadron, and in this area, a member of the Lakes Region Sail & Power Squadron. He is a certified volunteer who has been trained to perform these checks. A VSC takes between 15 and 20 minutes to complete.
